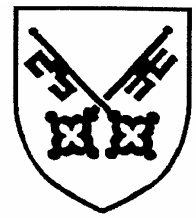

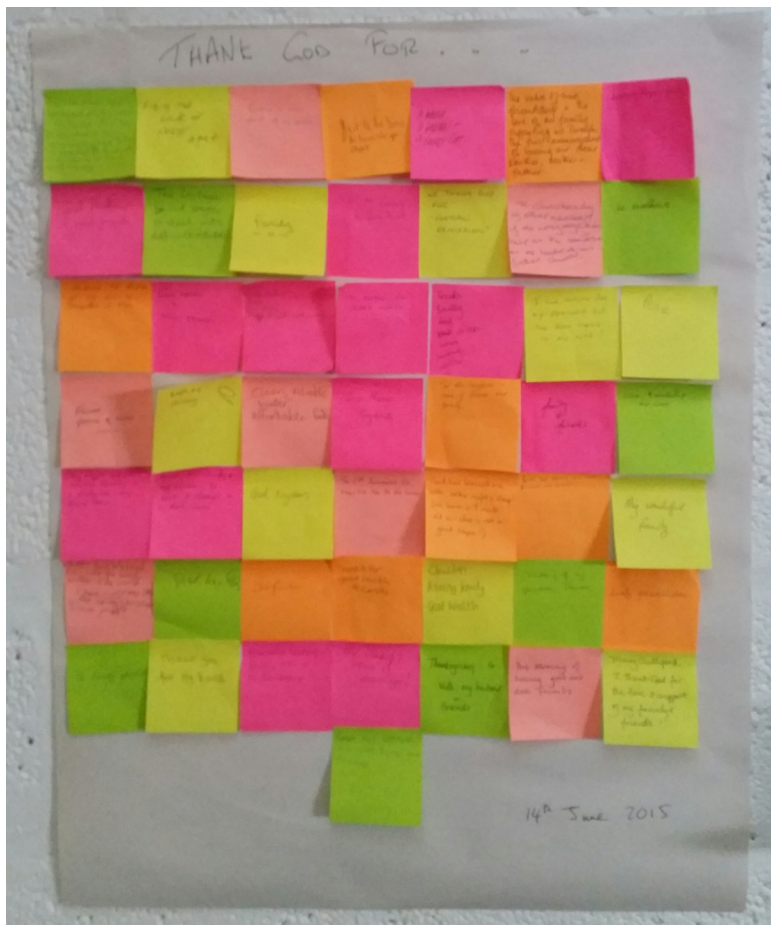

Film Night: What is it to be “human”?

On 26th June, we watched the first of the brilliant re-imagining of the Planet of the Apes films. Starring Andy Serkis as the soon-to-be leader of the Apes, the film suggested that the Planet of the original films was created by animal testing. Caesar the chimpanzee is used to test drugs that might help cognitive function in Alzheimer’s patients. As a result, his cognitive function improves. After an incident with a neighbour, Caesar is sent to a holding centre for violent apes where he discovers that he isn’t the only one who can talk.

The issue we considered with the film is: are humans alone in being made in God’s image? Does all creation share something of the divine – in which case, what does that say about creepy crawlies we don’t like? There have been test cases going through various courts in the world putting forward the idea of “human rights” being extended to the Great Apes (the ones closest to humans in measurable language and cognition tests). If the image of God in us is our conscience, are there signs that other animals show a knowledge of good and evil and so having consciences? There are certainly plenty of “dog-shaming” videos online

which show animals apparently aware that they have done wrong and looking ashamed and pleading.

Are those who have no conscience – psychopaths – therefore not human, in which case, are they subject to human law? Are those who are unable to understand the concept of good and evil – those with severe learning disabilities for example – to be considered less than human? Or – as toddlers have to be taught to share and what is ‘good’ and ‘bad’ behaviour is the conscience not, in fact, what defines us as human?

The next film we will watch will be *Transcendence* (2014), starring Johnny Depp. We are made in the image of God and the accounts of creation throughout the Bible make it clear that the physical body is not a punishment or sinful, but all part of God’s good and beautiful creation. If so, is it necessary for us to have a physical body to be fully human and therefore made in the image of God? *Film: 1hour 59 minutes*

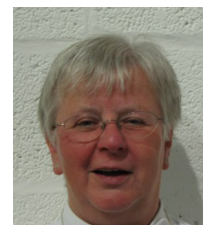
