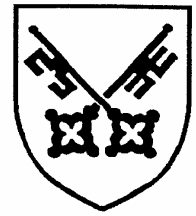

## How does your faith change lives around you?

Over the years, St Peter's has engaged in the community in Didcot in many ways. For decades, it has provided the Carer and Toddler group, now called Little Fishes, it ran a youth group, had a Mothers' Union branch that was active in mission and ministry. Most recently, it has set up a branch of the St John's Guild, seen the start of both Wednesday Church and Wednesday Fellowship, actively supported Didcot TRAIN and the Didcot Food Bank, and been a key player in setting up the Credit Union – Didcot Community Bank.

These are all areas of social action that arise out of Christian faith. Our Victorian predecessors went in for these "good works" in a big way. I have often joked that they did it out of guilt for all their exploitation of workers, but the work of Quakers like the Cadbury and Mackintosh families and others to improve their workers conditions and health – even to founding large towns like Bourneville, with schools, hospitals, colleges, universities and so on - really can't be sneered at. Over the next year, I will run occasional accounts of some of the people who have lived out their Christian faith in this way, hopefully as an inspiration for the people of Didcot St Peter's to continue to engage in community work.

Titus Salt was born in 1803, near Leeds and educated at Morley, Batley and Wakefield before joining the family wool trade at the age of 17. He married on 21<sup>st</sup> August 1830, which seems to have motivated him to look at ways of expanding and improving the business. He invested heavily in a new type of wool -

Donskoi wool, from sheep farmed on the banks of the river Don, in Russia. Although not the first to introduce the UK to Alpaca wool, imported from Peru, he was most successful in developing it into an attractive fabric, earning a mention in one of Charles Dickens' books.



With over 200 factory chimneys churning out thick black smoke, Bradford gained the reputation of being the most polluted town in England. Salt was one of the few employers in the town who showed any concern for this problem. After much experimentation, he discovered an efficient burner that produced comparatively little soot. In 1842 he arranged for these burners to be used in all his factories. When he realised other factory owners and the council were unwilling to take action over the pollution, he decided to move from Bradford.

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## How does *your* faith ...

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In 1853, with a grand banquet for his 50<sup>th</sup> birthday, Titus Salt opened a new super large mill and model village at Saltaire, near Shipley. Salt hoped that the cleaner Aire Valley would help protect his workers from the cholera epidemics that were common in poorer areas of Bradford. The model village of Saltaire, included 823 houses, shops, a hospital, schools, chapels, recreation facilities and churches for his workers. Fresh water was piped into each home from Saltaire's own 500,000 gallon reservoir. Gas was also laid on to provide lighting and heating. Unlike the people of Bradford, every family in Saltaire had its own outside lavatory. To encourage people to keep themselves clean, Salt also arranged for public baths and wash-houses to be built.

Although the model village, like those built by Mackintosh and Cadbury, did not include Public Houses, Salt wasn't a teetotaler himself. He filled many civic roles, including that of alderman, Justice of the Peace, Chief Constable, Deputy Lord Lieutenant, mayor and MP for Bradford (serving only two years as ill-health forced him to retire). He was created Baronet of Saltaire and Crow Nest. When asked why he engaged in such unceasing social action, he replied "to do good, and give [my] sons employment."

He was a great philanthropist of the age, helping his workers have unprecedented living standards for the time. When he died in 1876, although he had been an extremely rich man, his family was horrified that his fortune was gone. It has been estimated that during his life he had given away over £500,000 to good causes. Bradford gave him a civic funeral, watched by 100,000 people.

## Pentecost 2016

With the early Easter, the great feast of Pentecost takes place on 15<sup>th</sup> May this year.

This was the day that saw the birth of the Christian Church, when the disciples in the Upper Room received the gifts of the Holy Spirit and rushed out into the world to proclaim the Good News. In John's Gospel, the Holy Spirit is described as "the Comforter" but the word used literally means "one called alongside". The Holy Spirit is the one whom God calls alongside us to help us on our Christian journey.

We are deeply privileged to be welcoming the 1<sup>st</sup> Didcot Boys and Girls Brigade to St Peter's for their first Parade Service with us. Olivia and her team of volunteers set up the group last Autumn and in that time they have worked hard to earn their

badges and learn what it means to work as together a group. At first sight, it might appear that they play a lot of games, but these are team games designed to help with collaboration. Each week they have a lesson from the Bible, and they earn extra merit points for attending their church (many of the children belong to the other denominations here in Didcot).

More importantly, this will be the first time some of the children experience Sunday worship – as pupils at Northbourne, they have regular assemblies and come to St Peter's for their special services. Whilst we are privileged to be joined by these young people, learning more about the Christian life, we also have a responsibility.

I used the word 'welcoming' – and that is something that is the responsibility of everyone at St Peter's, week by week, but particularly on days like this. No-one can tell from looking at another person what their story is. You won't be able to tell whether they are used to church, or if it's completely new to them. You won't be able to tell if they are anxious, or excited. You won't be able to tell if they are happy in their home or school life, or not. But more importantly, it's not our place as Christians to judge anyone joining us at the altar on any of the above.

We are welcoming a group of people who God loves and treasures, as much as he loves and treasures us. Each of us, as the Body of Christ, is responsible for making sure that everyone who walks in our doors can really believe that God loves them. Wouldn't it be great if they left St Peter's feeling like it's *the* place where they really met Jesus Christ in the face of all his faithful followers?

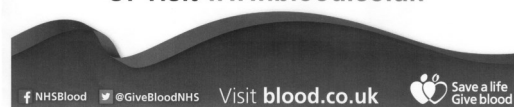

# Saying Goodbye

## 2016

The loss of a baby during pregnancy, at birth or in infancy is a devastating experience for the parents and for the extended family. For people that lose prior to 24-weeks gestation, there is often no service held or time to commemorate the life that has been lost, while for parents who lose later in pregnancy, at birth or in early years, services are normally conducted while the parents are in the depths of grief.

The **Saying Goodbye** services are the first national set of remembrance services, for people who have suffered the loss of a baby, whether that be recently or decades ago. They provide a time and place to acknowledge and remember your baby, whilst collectively 'saying goodbye'.

The services are for people of any faith or no faith, are free to attend, and people are invited to bring family, friends and children with them. The services are held at Cathedrals, Minsters and similar locations across the globe, chosen for their beauty and grandeur; a wonderful tribute for all lost babies.

Together we will say "our children did exist, they may have only been on this earth for days, weeks, months or years, but they were truly loved, and will always be missed!"
