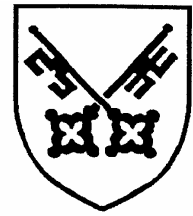

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## The Path to Ordination

The lead-up to ordination began with rehearsals at Christ Church cathedral on the Wednesday morning of our retreat at Ripon College, Cuddesdon – 24 nervous ordinands, complete with luggage, crammed into the Sub-dean's residence. Having to hand over our precious white stoles was an act of courage more than obedience to the 'sheepdogs' guarding us – Caroline, the Diocesan Director of Ordinands, one of her assistants, Alison, and Revd Canon Angela Tilby, the Diocesan Canon at the cathedral (who also took one of our Sunday services during the last interregnum). Angela had written a wonderful piece for the *Church Times*, reflecting on her (not very good) treatment in the few days before her deaconing, and the difference when she was priested the following year, leading one or two of us to ask if we were going to have bottles of G&T left in our rooms at college! The silent retreat was led by Rt. Rev. Peter Maurice, the retired Bishop of Taunton, and it was excellent. At our evening service on the Friday, we experienced the spiritually-powerful and emotional act of having our feet washed by +Peter. The following morning (after a small celebration with Alison and Sam, my two friends from the Local Ministry Programme, the

previous night – we were allowed to talk by then!), seven of us had a hasty breakfast after a very short service of Morning Prayer in chapel and were bundled on to the coach and taken off to the cathedral, looking smart in our clerical shirts. The 'system' then kicked in and we made all our legal declarations and oaths in front of the Diocesan Chancellor's representative, Bishop Colin and Archdeacon Judy French, signing our lives over to God's service. The declaration was much the same as the one I had made when I was licensed as License Lay Minister back in 2004 only this time it was different. After this it was then a matter of waiting for Christopher, the Dean's Verger, to lead us into the cathedral, to a great welcome of singing and light. For those who haven't been to an ordination service, there's a long period of kneeling for the ordinands, and we were concerned about standing up in a dignified manner at the right moments, and not getting cramp! Sitting on the opposite side of the cathedral crossing were my three nominated supporters (Fr Nicholas, Fr Edward and Jo, my Franciscan friend and colleague, who had been instrumental in 'encouraging' me to see a vocations adviser) and a little further down the aisle were

my sister and some friends, in a prime position to see the action. Each ordinand was called up to be ordained deacon by +Colin. Eventually we were vested with our stoles by our incumbents and allowed to greet family and friends during the Peace, which was very emotional – many of them had travelled with us on our journeys and had known our highs and lows. Each of us had been allocated to a distribution station for the Eucharist, and it was there I met a contingent from the Didcot Railway Centre and some other Franciscan Tertiaries. After a small gathering at a local hotel, it was time to go home and prepare for the rest of my ministry (and do the laundry!).

When we are ordained we start off as deacons, then most become priests, possibly progressing to other roles within the Church's hierarchy, but we never give up the role of deacon – even the Archbishop of Canterbury is a deacon. We have a specific task:

*“Deacons are to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's Kingdom. They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed as agents of God's purposes of love. ... reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.”*

We're something of the shepherd of St Luke's Gospel, searching for the sheep that is lost and bringing it back to the flock. There are a lot of

people in our society who need help, support and encouragement and much of this pastoral work happens when visiting the bereaved and helping them plan funerals for their loved ones. I also believe that being a visible presence within our communities will somehow reassure people that God hasn't abandoned them. I have found that people are more inclined to say hello when they see me wearing my dog-collar and I've had some good conversations with check-out operators in our shops. The collar is my reminder that I've been ordained to serve God's people and to try and reflect his love.

Our training didn't end with our ordinations; we have another 3 years to go of formal learning and including a ministry project. For this my aim is to consider how we can reach out to people, including the 'un-churched', through informal non-sacramental worship. This might mean starting with celebrating a special event, and happen no more than once a term. We could also look at opening St Peter's for coffee / tea etc. Those who come to the 9.30am Eucharist on Thursdays stay for coffee if they can and it would be good to open it up to anyone who walks past the church at that time. It needn't happen on every Thursday (we do have to consider available times for funerals) and even just once a month could lead to people crossing the threshold for the first time. If anyone has any ideas on that, please do talk to me. It might be 'my' ministry project but it is 'our' church and we should all be involved in promoting God's love to all and especially to those who live and work in our part of Didcot.

## Three Bed Accommodation Needed for Syrian Refugees

South Oxfordshire and Vale of the White Horse District Councils have committed to resettling a number of Syrian refugees.

They manage to source private rented accommodation for some two hundred households on average each year, but are really struggling with finding landlords who will take, as tenants, Syrian refugees. Pretty much all the landlords and agents that they usually deal with have said no to them.

There is a very substantial financial package being offered to landlords, as well as a very robust ongoing support package being provided by The Red Cross who are specialists in this area. Everything is provided for the refugees, down to pots and pans and toys for the kids and a TV (its all second hand but functional), with money from the Government. They just desperately need the accommodation to house them. It needs to be three bedrooms, in an area near facilities; the council can do the rest.

Do we have any landlords out there who would rent their three bed-roomed house through the council to help the Councils help refugees?

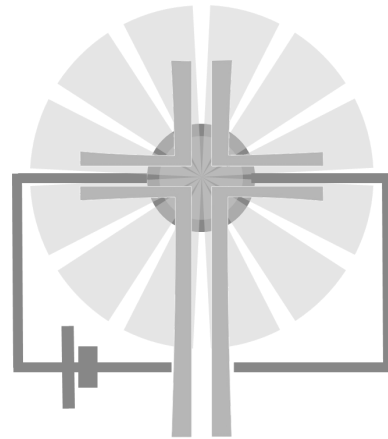

## Crossing the Gap

News from St Matthew's Harwell, with All Saints' Chilton

Crossing the Gap – a project exploring science and faith – is launching in South Oxfordshire this September.



Modern atheists maintain that Science has disproved God; that our technological world has squeezed out Christianity. Harwell and Chilton Churches is planning to investigate if that is true – with the help of one of the first eight grants to be awarded by the new Science in Congregations project (supported by the World Templeton Foundation). Our project is called 'Crossing the Gap'.

There are three strands of activity, each promoting the compatibility between science and Christian faith. Starting in September the last Friday of the month is family science club – hands-on science and thinking about faith for all the family. Fortnightly on Thursdays the churches' adult science and faith discussion group – established last year - will engage with new material and thought provoking discussion. The third strand features three eminent speakers in the field of science and faith visiting the locality to deliver a public lecture over the next year.

The project will be launched with a party at Harwell Church Hall, OX11 0EZ, on Saturday 24th September from 3pm to 4:30pm.
